


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HEY.

Thanks to that summer, the lives of many were changed into way better, soccer-filled ones. As it has done with most things, the USA had shown the way for the rest of mankind. After years of trying, everyone could now take this sport to their hearts.

The '94 World Soccer Cup in America was therefore the sport's platform to popularity. My own platform would come almost twenty years later.

The excitement of soccer was burning inside me, and I started to read around. Amazingly, I discovered that many places right around the world had already been playing the sport for a long time. Places in Europe had establishized pretty lame leagues that could not even afford cheerleaders.

When the internet came along, I found it even easier to find out cool stuff about the history of soccer, and by the turn of the millennium I was pretty much fluent in soccer speak. Being recognized for my depth of soccer knowledge was surely not too far away.

By the time fall came around, I had hit the big time. After years of loving soccer I had become one of the most powerful voices within the sport.

So I guess getting asked to write a book was pretty much expected. Sure, I am honored, but it's not so much of a big deal. It's kinda expected. Like I said at the start of this: if you got the talent, all you gotta do is find that platform. I found it. A look at some of soccer's most insane moments through American eyes is something that hasn't really been done before—go check the bookstore. Having just notched up another World Soccer Cup, a book that does this is nodoubtedly overdue.

Soccer is way more than just the goalshots, and this book will hopefully show this, ranging from the real famous moments—like major felony cards in World Soccer Cup finals and Landon Donovan wearing a sports bra—to lesser known events like some German cheerleader unexpectedly getting a cleat-rocket right in her face.

So go right ahead! Enjoy the read as you educize yourself on some of the weirdest events to take place on and around the soccer field.





The opening ceremony of the greatest World Soccer Cup the world has ever seen was one of the high points in soccer history. It is widely known by many as the day that soccer really started. The organizers were clearly pretty smart guys and, realizing that nothing screams 'World Soccer Cup' more than a Motown diva, they invited Diana Ross along to join the party.

Singing some song, the climax would be when Ross ran up to a soccer ball and kicked it real hard into the soccer net past a helpless goaltender. Then, the goal would fall apart and she'd run through it and go someplace else, making a truly *supreme* spectacle in front of the eyes of the watching world.

The problem was, Diana Ross is not a soccer player. Her deathstrike technique was bad, and she wound up kicking the sphere of leather way wide of the soccer goal. Even if the goaltender had been trying to *reach out and touch* the soccer ball, he would have got nowhere near it. This sparked a *chain reaction* of laughter right around the world and turned Diana Ross' love for all things soccer well and truly *upside down*.

Nevertheless, the party had started.



In their black and white striped uniform, Juventus Soccer Franchise is one of the world's most recognizable soccer franchises. With humongous support around Italy, life seemed pretty good for the Old Ladies back in the mid-'00s. At the end of the '06 soccer season, they'd just become Serious A World Champions again. But the 'Old Ladies', as they are known, were about to have one humongous fall. Reports hit the press that one of the Juventus director guys had tried to organize which soccer referees refereed soccer in their soccer matches. A serious felony in soccer, if the reports were true.

Diego Madonna was the world soccer MVP and, it being the mid-'80s, was not yet the guy who became fat and took drugs and stuff. The two different sides of Madonna were shown up by the two goalshots he inserted on this day.

After half time-out, the scores were still knotted at 0s. A kick-pass over a mixed-up English deefense line saw the soccer ball wind up heading toward the edge of the English danger box zone. The English goaltender rushed out to try to make the hand denial. Madonna's nose sniffed out a lotta stuff during his lifetime but, on this occasion, that guy's nose could only sniff a goalshot opportunity.

Seeing the charging goaltender, the hobbit-like genius ran toward the soccer ball. As the soccer ball bounced up real high into the hot Mexican air, Madonna jumped up like some kinda fish in an Alaskan stream. Being real small, it would have been literally impossible for Madonna to issue the headkick and knowing this, he reached out an arm and kicked the ball with his hand and over the goaltender. Into the soccer goal interior it went.

Off the little guy went, clapping high fives to his buddies and hollering with total soccer joy. On the other hand, the English were pretty pissed at this and went insane at the soccer referee. Despite them being real mad, the goalshot was permitted.

After his felony-drenched first, Madonna added another less memorable goalshot. He took the soccer ball some place in the middle

sector of the soccer field and ran past a load of deefense players before inserting. This was a way better goalshot, so the English guys probably didn't mind so much.

Toward the completion whistle, some guy who went on to famously advertize potato chips pulled one back. The score finished 2 to 1 at the completion whistle: the English were out, and the Argentinish were through.


But one week in particular stands out from Mario's English adventure. After inviting a few of his buddies over to his place, reports broke that Mario had decided it'd be pretty cool to go let off some fireworks in his bathroom. He went right ahead and did this and, sure enough, a fire broke out in his house. Within an hour a fire truck from the MCFD had to be called out to stop the whole place burning to the ground!

After reports of this made the news, many expected Mario to start the next weekend's eagley anticipized Manchester Derby soccer match from the sub shack (if he was to make the roster at all). To the surprise of a load of guys, Coach Mankini gave Buyatelly a slot in the start-out line-up. The decision paid off pretty good for the City soccer coach too, as it was Buyatelly who opened up the goalshot tally that day as the Full Mooners crushed cross-town franchise the Manchester Unity 6 to 1 in their own soccer field. After inserting the soccer ball into the soccer goal interior, Mario lifted his soccer jersey to reveal a shirt underneath with a message reading 'WHY ALWAYS ME?'

As far as soccer heads go, Zidenine Zidane had one of the most famous. It had already kicked in two outta the three goals for France Soccer Club in their 1998 World Soccer Cup final victory.

But when the French reached another World Soccer Cup final in 2006, it was famous for all the wrong reasons.

In the German city of Berlin, Germany, the scores were all tied up at ones with the soccer in the World Soccer Cup between France and Italy. The game was headed to a Deathstrike Showdown.

The two guys that had already scored that night were Zidane for the French and deefense guy Maserati for the Italians. Reports suggested that Maserati had been a total douchebag to Zidane all night, constantly grabbing a hold of his jersey.

Having tolerized it for most of the soccer match, Zidane had gotten pretty mad by this stage. A conversation took place between the two athletes on the edge of the Italian DBZ. Ashamed by his actions, he never played soccer again. With one kick with his head, the completion whistle had been blown on one of the game's all-time MVPs.



Paolo Di Caprio was an EPL favourite in the late '90s and early '00s, representing the franchises of Sheffield Midweekers, Westside Hammers and the Charleston Athletes.

His style of soccer was great and he was undeniafiably one of the EPL's stars during his stay in England. But there were moments of drama too.

Di Caprio is famously remembered for what happened this one time he was playing a soccer match at the hump-day-named franchise from Sheffield. A hockey-style fight broke out on the soccer field between the Midweekers players and players from their opponents that day, London Arsenal. After the whole thing cooled down a little, Di Caprio was taken to one side and given a major felony card by the soccer referee.

Things were already pretty bad for the fired-up Italian, but they were about to get way worse. Totally mad at the decision, Di Caprio grabbed a hold of the soccer referee and pushed the guy down to the grass-covered field. Off he went to take a shower. This was the last that was seen of Di Caprio for a real long time.

But this story does have some kinda happy ending. A couple of years later—once Di Caprio had moved on to Westside Hammers in London and had not pushed any more soccer referees over—in a soccer match with Evertown, Di Caprio was given the chance to make the score into the Soccer Candies' net. To the shock of everybody in the Goodison Candy Shack Soccer Park that day, Di Caprio picked up the soccer ball with his hands and pointed to some Evertown guy that had got hurt on the floor.

After being shown as a total soccer douche for the soccer-referee push only a couple of years before, Paolo Di Caprio had learnt from his misdemeanor and shown that he was a pretty nice guy after all.



Glasgow Raiders were kicked outta the Scotch EPL in 2012, breaking the hearts of Scotch soccer fans everywhere. After having no money, the decision was made to send the Raiders to some lame league.

The impact on the city of Glasgow was pretty big. The Raiders are one of few Scotch franchises that people have heard of, and this meant that the cross-town franchise, The Celtics (the Boston Celtics' Scotch soccer franchise) would not be able to do soccer in the eagley anticipized Old Friends derby for a real long time.

The Raiders sure were mad, but there was nothing that the Ibronx franchise could do except lace up those soccer cleats, dust off their soccer uniforms and go get some wins. And that is what they've been trying to do ever since.



Looking at the megastar that David Beckham has become, it's hard to imagine that he actually played soccer way before moving to California. This was the peak of his soccer career as he arrived Stateside to sign up to the Los Angeles Galaxy in Major League Soccer.

Not many remember Beckham's soccer career pre-LA, but he had already represented Manchester Unity and Real Salt Lake's Spanishbased Madrid franchise before he made the switch to the Los Angeles Galaxy, and 'Goalshot Balls' excited soccer fans right around the world as he got off the airplane at LAX.

'Goalshot Balls', as he had become known, was lethal with his felony kicks and was well known for accurately kicking his accurate cross-pass kicks with real accuracy. He continued to do nice soccer in the States, and even got his hands on the MLS cup—his finest soccer moment.

Since hanging up his cleats in 2013, Beckham has turned his attention to starting out his own MLS franchise. Confirmization that this will be in Miami, FL, has also been made.



Previous hosts of the World Soccer Cup have always had at least one of a couple of things in common:

They are pretty awesome at the sport (USA, Brazil, Germany, Italy, Spain)

🎦 They are crazy for it (England, Mexico)

With those two things in mind, then, World Soccer President Seth Blatter and his buddies shocked the world in 2010 when he decided to award the 2022 competition to a place called 'Qatar', rejecting the opportunity to take the tournament back to the United States of America, where the standard was set for the tournament in 1994.


Terry Henry was one of the game's megastars. Having scored goalshots by the truckload for London Arsenal, Henry had left the Soccer Cannons for Barcelonia in EPL Spain, where his soccer would ultimately gain him a move to the big time with the New York Red Bulls.

With the game tied up and heading for deathstrikes, the soccer ball reached Henry in the Irish danger box zone. Henry struggled to get that soccer ball under control and, as it headed outta play, he kicked it away from the perimeter line with his hand, before making a pass-kick to some other French guy, who inserted it into the SGI!

The soccer referee did not see the hand felony, and the goalshot was allowed. Unfortunately for the Irish, it was to be the only one of the soccer match, leaving them looking like a bunch of wolf cubs that just watched some real mean guy cut off their mom's head with an axe.

Goalshot What soccer is all about. If your franchise is gonna win at soccer they gotta score more goalshots than their opponents.









Back in 2008, the English city of Manchester, England, was already pretty famous on the soccer scene. Along with rock band The Beatles, Manchester was also host to the Manchester Unity—world famous throughout the world for being one of the most trophied soccer franchises in existence.

That summer, the Manchester soccer skyline was about to change forever. A few blocks away from the Unity's Old Trafford Center soccer stadium, you find the city's other franchise—Manchester City. Famous for being pretty lame compared to their red-uniformed cross-town buddies, the guys from the City of Manchester Soccer Park were spectacularly bought out by the Abou Diaby royal family, instantly transforming them into one of the richest sports franchises in the world of sport.

The new owners quickly spent the dollars on a roster overhaul, and the soccer franchise became pretty awesome, prompting the Unity's Coach Ferguson to name them the 'real loud neighbors'. The years that have followed the Abou Diaby buyout have been pretty cool for the fans of this soccer franchise. 2011 saw them end their trophy famine as they beat Stoked City at the Wembley Arena to win the England Franchise Association Cup. Better was to follow as the guys claimed their first EPL World Championship in a real long time in dramatic style in 2012.

Zaire were clearly pumped to be doing their soccer at the 1974 World Soccer Cup. But when defending a dangerous felony kick against Brazil Soccer Club, they were way *too* pumped.

As the Salsa Boys put the soccer ball down, the referee blew the whistle to start the play. Before the Brazilians had chance to even move, some asshat from Zaire ran real quick and kicked the soccer ball right the way to the other end of the soccer field.

Not knowing the rules of soccer, the African guy must have felt like a complete douchebag. This was a felony that would be punishable with a minor offense card as the Brazilians took the victory points in an easy 3 to 0 victory.

Although he did look stupid, the guy later claimed that he had been trying to get the major felony card in protest at not being paid by the Zaire.



London, England—home to the Queen. In 2003, one of the richest guys in Russia decided to make her one of his neighbors when he splashed out on buying a soccer franchise.

Chelsea Franchise Club were Roman Ibrahimovic's choice, and his purchase would change the face of the EPL League forever. At the time, the franchise named were not that great, although they had managed to make it into the playoffs for the Euro Soccer Cup.

Almost immediately Ibrahimovic started to buy way better players for the blue guys and let some of the lamer soccer players go off someplace else. It was the ultimate franchise-enhancement window as international soccer legends such as Hermán Crespo and Ron Geremi walked through the doors of Stanford Bridge.

The free-spending franchise soon turned out to be one of the winningest, too, claiming back-to-back EPL World Championships in 2005 and 2006 for the first time in fifty years.

Some soccer players have made a name for themselves by being able to kick a soccer ball into the net directly from a felony kick. Here are ten of the best.

10 Robert O'Carlos

The little Brazilian with supersized thighs kicked soccer balls real hard throughout his soccer career

9 Didier Dogbra

The African was as awesome at making a score from a felony kick as he was from winning them.

8 Cristiarnold Ronaldo

The Portugaleze kicks ass when it comes to kicking felony kicks into the soccer goal interior.

7 Andreas Pearlo

The felony kicks of this Italian guy are as artistic as one of Mozart's paintings.

6 Stevie Gee

The guy from Mercy town has racked a whole bunch of great felony kicks for Liver Pool and England Soccer Club.

5 Iron Robben

What this guy lacks in hair he makes up for in felony kick ability.

4 RSVP

Another Dutch guy, RSVP can punish any franchise with one flash of that left cleat.

3 David Beckham

The former British captain perfected his felony kick when he arrived in the MLS.

2 Junhinho

After playing in the EPL way back for Middlesberg, the Brazilian went on to be one of the most successful felony kick strikers in the world for the Olympic Lyon Franchise in EPL France.

Clint Dempsey

A soccer player so good that he doesn't even need to take felony kicks that much.



Back in 1984, the Euro Soccer Cup was hosted in the Italian city of Rome. Despite being home to the oldest soccer stadium in the world, the Colosseum, the soccer match was played in some other place.

As is usually the case, two franchises would face off for the Cup that night. Liver Pool of England had travelled to Rome on a quest to go win their fourth Euro Soccer Cup. Their opponent franchise had not had to travel that far. Rome Franchise Club—actually from Rome—were doing soccer on their own soccer field. Playing in their home town was not the advantage that the Rome guys would have thought. To be fair, the soccer match was pretty bad and ended—like a lot of soccer finals tend to knotted up.

With each franchise scoring one goalshot each, for the first time in the history of soccer history, the Euro Soccer Cup final would be decided on a deathstrike showdown. After a few guys scored, some other guys did not—but this soccer match will be remembered for the actions of the Liver Pool goaltender, Bruce Gobbler.

Inspirized by Italian food, Gobbler started goofing around when one of the Italian guys was about to do his deathstrike, pretending his legs were made outta spaghetti and that he was real scared.

Although pretty funny to watch, this was an attempt to totally psych out the Italian guy...and it sure did work! He kicked that soccer ball real hard and way over the pipes. The following deathstrike was inserted by one of Gobbler's buddies, and Liver Pool had their hands on the Euro Soccer Cup again.

Liver Pool would wait over twenty years to go win another ESC, and the actions of Gobbler would also play a part that night too.



Soccer, they say, is a game of two quarters. Never before has this quirky little phrase been more appropriate.

Finishing behind Mercy Town rivals Evertown in the EPL League, 2005 had pretty much sucked for the red-uniformed Liver Pool. A consolization was that they had made it all the way to the Euro Soccer Cup, where they would face Italian franchise Ace Milan in what those European guys call the 'Super Bowl of Soccer'.

What happened in the first quarter of the game was kinda like watching your pet dog get run over by a monster truck. Old guy Paul O'Maldini and Hermán Crespo had been like soccer artists painting some kind of real nice soccer masterpiece, leaving the guys with the Liver Duck on their franchise emblem 3–zip down as they headed into the locker rooms for half time-out.

But, when a Stevie Gee headkick found its way into the score net, a totally insane six minutes of soccer were about to get played.

A few minutes later, some other guy did a kick from real far out. The Brazilian goaltender looked like he was gonna just pick the soccer ball up but, after a major hand fail, the soccer ball got into the soccer goal interior once again. Outta nowhere, the English were right back in the soccer match at 3 to 2.

Right after that, Liver Pool got the soccer ball back and made yet another offensive play on the Ace's danger box zone. A mistimed depossession slide brought down Stevie Gee and a deathstrike was awarded. Spanish guy Chavvy Alonso kicked it, but Dido made the hand denial...the soccer ball Rick O'Shead right back to Alonso who kicked it into the SGI. The equalization had been made.

After the comeback, Liver Pool took the soccer match through to a

deathstrike showdown. After a bunch of fails for the Aces, Liver Pool took the victory, and the big shiny cup was lifted by Stevie Gee, as 'You Never Walk Away' got sung real loud by the happy fans.

Headkick A bodily movement done by the body where the soccer ball is kicked by the head. This can be done all over the soccer field and is best done when the soccer ball is in the air.



Before heading to England, Eric Cantuna was well known in France for being a little crazy. He had got in a couple of bust-ups with a few guys from his own franchise and, in one incident, ripped off his soccer jersey and kicked the soccer ball into the crowd when asked to head back to the sub shack. In the end, it was time for him to head to England, and he arrived at the Manchester Unity via Leeds Union.

Under the soccer coaching of Coach Ferguson, it appeared Cantuna had chilled out, and he was a humongous part of their success in the '94 EPL World Championship and Franchise Association Cup victories.

Fast forward a few months on from the end of that awesome Soccer Devil season, and Manchester Unity were looking to go win some more trophies as the '94–'95 season was heating up. This time it was the Blackburn Roosters that were heading for the EPL World Championship, but the Unity were right behind.

Eric Cantuna was the Unity's MVP, and things started going real bad for his franchise one January night in January 1995. After kicking some guy in a soccer match, Cantuna was issued with the major felony card. Already, this was bad news for him, but when a soccer fan in the crowd started shouting some mean stuff about Cantuna's mom, the Unity man went totally insane.

Having been walking to the locker room, Cantuna turned and walked toward the guy in the crowd and launched at him with his soccer cleat. Eventually the fight got broke up, but the soccer world was in total shock.

Cantuna wound up with a real long ban from the soccer field. It was a major loss for his franchise as the Unity lost out to the Roosters for the EPL World Championship.

Cantuna confused the hell out of everyone when he found out that he was banned from soccer for a real long time:

'Sometimes a bunch of seagulls go flying after a boat, they do this because they're probably pretty hungry and just want some sardines or something.'

What he said was probably true, but to this day, nobody knows why he even did that.



One thing's for sure, it doesn't get any bigger than a World Soccer Cup semi-final. In 2002 Turkey were playing Brazil Soccer Club for a shot at making the final.

The Brazilian guys had one of the most winningest rosters at that soccer tournament, and one of their main stars was Barcelonia's talented Rivaldo.

A whole load of soccer talent does not always mean that you can't act like a jerk though—as Rivaldo would show. As he went to take a restart kick from the corner, some Turkish guy kicked the soccer ball to him, hitting him on the lower leg armor.

The three minutes of soccer that followed were three of the most insane moments in the history of soccer.

From a corner restart kick, Beckham kicked the soccer ball into the danger box zone and, after the Germans failed to make the box evacuation kick, Terry Sheringham wrapped his soccer cleat around the soccer ball and sent it in the soccer goal interior. The equalization had been made and the red sector of the Nude Camp went crazy... but the Unity were not finished there.

Terry John was the on-field leader of Chelsea Franchise Club, and suddenly faced off with the most important kick of a soccer ball he had ever faced.



Their deefense held out until just before half time-out when the equalization was made by one of the players of that particular tournament, Clint Dempsey. The way that the soccer ball entered the soccer goal interior, however, left the English goaltender feeling like a bit of a dumbass.

Well known right around the soccer world for having a real powerful shot, Dempsey did not kick the soccer ball that hard, and it rolled real slow toward Robbie Green. With the simple task of picking the soccer ball up, Green made one of the most famous hand-denial fails ever made as the soccer ball slipped underneath him.

5 Gianluigi Buffet

Since moving to the Juventus franchise in Italy, soccer fans have been well fed on awesome goaltendering thanks to this Buffet. He also won the World Soccer Cup of 2006.

4 Casey Keller

An American hero who denied the goalshots of thousands in EPL England for a short while before heading back to the MLS.

3 Brad Guzan

The latest off the production line of sparse-haired American goaltenders is Brad Guzan from Illinois. Playing for Ass Town Vanilla, he's already one of the greatest.

2 Tim Howard

After a brief spell at the Manchester Unity, T-Ho has totally owned it in Evertown.

Brad Friedel

Real old. Real awesome. Brad Friedel still going strong.



When Totten Ham Whitespurs went to Manchester Unity's Old Trafford Center in 2005, they hadn't won a soccer match there in forever.

With the two franchises locked at 0s entering the later minutes of the second quarter, Portugaleze soccer player Pedalo Mendes decided he was gonna try to score a goalshot from his own defensive sector. Just near the half-sector line, Mendes kicked the soccer ball real hard toward the Unity soccer goal. It looked like a simple receive for the Unity goaltender, Ray Carroll, but that was not the case. He dropped it, and the soccer ball bounced back into the Unity SGI for what would surely hand the Soccer Chickens the victory points.

In desperation, Carroll threw himself over the SGI line and hooked the soccer ball back into play. As the Whitespurs fans went crazy with soccer joy, something kinda weird happened. The Unity continued to play soccer. Despite being an undeniafiable goalshot, the soccer referee and his helper guys did not see it. A real mad Totten Ham Whitespurs had to settle for the tie point, but it should been all three.



Coach McClaren's failure to take England Soccer Club to some soccer tournament had already cost him his job. The picture of him holding an umbrella at the side of a soccer field had caused a bunch of newspapers to say real mean stuff about him.



When the new millennium started in approximately 2000, life seemed great for the soccer fans of Leeds Union, England. The Yorkashire state franchise were putting together a group of great soccer players and starting to look like the real deal: serious contenders for the EPL World Championship by 2001 and enjoying an awesome run in the Euro Soccer Cup, making it all the way to the semi-finals before losing.

To the horror of the Leeds soccer fans, this was as good as it got for their beloved franchise. After getting a few sums wrong, Leeds Union were losing money. Within a couple of years, they had to sell some of their better soccer players and found themselves staring at a battle to maintain their EPLism.

After losing a few soccer matches, Leeds Union, one of the biggest franchises in England, lost to Bowltown Wonders in the last round of matches in the 2004 EPL season. The defeat left them stuck in the EPL disaster sector with no escape. To this date, they have never returned to the English top league board.



Little is said about Beckham's pre-Los Angeles Galaxy career. His years in Manchester, England, were probably the most trophied, but they also contained some controversial moments.

In 2003, Beckham's time in at the Manchester Unity was coming to an end. Rumours circulized that Coach Ferguson and Beckham now hated each other, and this incident did nothing to cool those stories.

On the field, the Unity's rivalry with London Arsenal was still going strong, and when the Soccer Cannons came to the Manchester Unity for an England Soccer Cup match in 2003 it did not go too great for Coach Ferguson. The Cannons fired their way to victory, sending the Unity outta the Cup.

Mad at this, a red-faced Coach Ferguson went crazy back in the locker room. In his fury, he kicked a soccer cleat real hard across the room. David Beckham's head was in the way and, as the cleat struck his head, it opened up a cut that no Band-Aid would fix.

When pictures hit the press of Beckham's gash, it seemed that his time in Manchester was pretty much done. Beckham was understandably real mad at this, and he quit the Old Trafford Center that summer for a few years in EPL Spain.



When it came to soccer, 2010 was an awesome one for Africa. It was the first time the country got to see the World Soccer Cup on their patch. After all the other African states had got ejected from the tournament, the entire country was behind the remaining state of Ghana, who played Uruguay.

Back on the soccer goal line was Lewis Swearez who, realizing that they were facing defeat, reached out his arm and kicked the soccer ball away with his hand. After denying what would have been the winning goalshot, Swearez's felony earned him the major felony card, and the Africans were one successful deathstrike away from the next round.

Unfortunately, the deathstrike failed and Swearez, still on his way to the locker room, celebrated at the side of the field. To make things a whole lot worse for Africa, Ghana went and lost out on the deathstrike showdown. Swearez's felonyful actions had played a humongous part in Uruguay Soccer Club's victory.



Usually, it's pretty funny when guys cry about soccer, but the tears of Paul Gascoin in Italy back in 1990 melted the hearts of even the meanest of soccer fans.

England Soccer Club had not started the 1990 World Soccer Cup too good, so it was surprizing to everyone when they found themselves making it all the way to the semi-finals against the Germany Westsiders.

The talents of Totten Ham Whitespur's 'Gazza' had illuminized English soccer and he had been a pretty big part of the success of the English team, rightfully being labelled the Most Valuable Player by the guys on his team.

Although he was having an awesome time in Italy, there was a dark cloud on the horizon for the Londoner. Having already picked up a minor offense card earlier in the tournament, another in that game would mean that he would have to sit out the next match which, if the British had won, would have been the World Soccer Cup final itself.

Sure enough, Gazza picked up another minor OC after a mistimed depossession slide made more contact with the German guy than it did with the soccer ball. As the realization hit him, Gazza started to cry.

Despite being real sad, Gazza dusted himself down and got on with his soccer and the English managed to hold the Germany Westsiders to a tie. Sadly for the Three Lines, they missed out in the deathstrike showdown as the Germans made the final, which they eventually won.

Gazza had entered the tournament not even knowing if he'd play that much soccer. He got off the airplane back in England as a national hero and a soccer player that everybody loved. This would not be the last time he did his soccer in Italy either, as he left the Soccer Chickens for some Italian franchise a year later.

Depossession slide A skill used in the deefense when you gotta take the soccer ball off an opponent. You slide along that soccer-field floor and kick the soccer ball to safety.



SOCCERSPEAK...

Voluntary simulation plunge (VSP) One of the lamest parts of soccer, where a soccer player throws himself to the floor like he just got hurt but actually just wants a felony kick or the referee to go show their opponent the major felony card. Probably started out in Mexico.





If you attend soccer matches regularly, then you guys probably know what happens when a soccer referee makes a couple of mistakes. Soccer crowds can be brutally honest, and if a referee gets a couple of things wrong, you can expect to hear a typical 'the referee's a dumbass' chant rise up from around the soccer stadium.

As soccer fans, it can also be quite funny when the guy in charge gets something wrong. On this occasion Graham Pole, the British soccer referee, forgot the easiest of soccer sums: one minor offense card + one minor offense card = one major felony card.

Taking charge of a match between the soccer clubs of Australia and Croatia, Pole had already given some Croatian guy a minor offense card. When that same player concedified another felony kick right before the completion whistle, Pole handed out another. Bizarrely, no major felony card followed up.

After eventually blowing the completion whistle, the same Croatian guy got up in Pole's face going crazy at him. Finally, with the math skills of a dumbass kindergarten kid, Pole pulled out a third minor OC, finally followed by the major.

With a slight Rick O'Shea off the pipe, it went into the soccer goal interior, going down as one of the most awesome felony kicks ever!



When Portugaleze franchise Porto made a late equalization goalshot against the Manchester Unity in 2004, soccer fans had no idea who the crazy coach guy running down the soccer field perimeter line was.

Real happy that his franchise were gonna take the win on the aggregation law, this was the moment that most of the soccer world first met Coach Juan Mourinho.

Love them or hate them, VSPs sure are part of the modern game, and here are some of the most talked-about VSP incidents ever.

5 Jurgen Klinsmann

Before being coach of the USMNT, Coach Klinsmann was German. He even played for them, too. In the 1990 World Soccer Cup Final against Argentina Soccer Club, he fell over like he got hurt real bad.

This resulted in the deefense guy getting the major FC. The Argentines, well known for being totally fair on the soccer field and never attempting to cheat, were pretty mad when they went on to lose 1-0.

Coach Klinsmann still denies the VSP to this day, pointing out that if

there was no contact then he wouldn't have got his leg hurt so bad that it needed a Band-Aid.

4 Brian Carassco

If you switch around a couple of letters in this guy's first name, you get the word 'brain', but after what he did when playing soccer for the Chilli Under 20 team, maybe it's clear he didn't have one.

Aside from having one of the most decorated soccer careers of the modern era, Landon is well known for being one of the sport's funny guys.

Nothing illustrates this more than the All Stars soccer match back in 2001. When Jim Rooney ripped off his soccer jersey to celebrate a goalshot, he showed off a black sports bra to the millions watching around the globe. Copying the celebration of USA women's soccer player Brandi Chastain, this was dedicated to their favourite female athlete.

Landon Donovan, on the opposing franchise, was not to be outdone. When he tied up the soccer match in the 92nd minute, he too took off his jersey to reveal a black sports bra.

With the soccer world at his cleats, it was a moment that really stood out. Here was a guy that obviously had the talent to go all the way in the sport, yet he still could take a time out from all the serious stuff to show a great sense of humor.



If the MLS handed out an award for soccer douche of the year, Real Salt Lake's Fabián Espíndola would have been front of the queue after what happened this one time in LA back in 2008.

With the eyes of the soccer world fixed upon this corner of Los Angeles for the clash of these two Major League Soccer heavyweights, Espíndola ran away in delight as he put that soccer ball into the Galaxy's net. Visiting the Wembley Arena that night was Colombia Soccer Club, still recovering from their 2 to 1 thrashing by the USMNT the previous summer.

When the soccer ball found itself at the cleats of Harry Redknapp, he kicked it toward the soccer goal. From real far away, the shot was powerful but not that great, to be honest. Higuita, the Colombian goaltender, started to ready himself for a moment of magic.

Jumping real high into the air, it looked like he was just doing some lame-ass flip. As his feet came over the back of his head his heels kicked the soccer ball away and outta the danger box zone. The hand denial was named the Scorpion kick because of the way Higuita's body shape looked like one of those bugs you get in the desert.

Too bad for him, Battistown, the French guy, was pretty quick and got to the soccer ball first. As he kicked it, the ball went outta play, but Schumacher (German for cleat-maker) smashed into his opponent's French face.

Incredibly, the referee did not punish this felony and Schumacher got the soccer ball and got ready for the re-entry kick. Not dead, but it was clear that his opponent was hurt pretty bad—so bad that he left the soccer field with the medics and headed for the hospital.

The Germany Westsiders were eventually the winningest team that day, with Schumacher's hand denials in the deathstrike showdown enough to send the French guys back to France. But this soccer match would be remembered by a lotta soccer fans for this one body slam.

TOP 5 USA SOCCER LEGENDS

5 Freddy Adu

Fresh out of diapers, a real young version of this guy took the MLS by storm and had soccer-loving heads turning all over the place to take a look at him. He has gone on to do soccer right the way around the globe.

4 Clint Dempsey One of the game's global megastars, Clint Dempsey took the EPL League by storm when playing for Full Ham and eventually got a move to London when he played for Totten Ham Whitespurs. After a year for the Soccer Chickens, Dempsey broke British hearts when he moved back to the MLS with the Seattle Sounders.

3 Brad Friedel Real old Brad Friedel has been a shining light for goaltenders across Planet Soccer for many years. Like some real ugly kid who nobody wants, Brad Friedel has been passed around from one EPL franchise to another, but that's not to say that nobody wants him. He remains one of the winningest goaltenders in the game and is renowned for his awesome hand denials.

2 Landon Donovan After playing soccer in Germany and England, Landon Donovan's time with the LA Galaxy has earned him a reputation for being a 'one-franchise guy'. An MLS legend, even the arrival of David Beckham to Los Angeles could not keep Landon in the shade. In fact, more soccer fans started

to turn out to LA Galaxy games after Beckham started playing for them just to support Landon Donovan.

Alexi Lalas

A guy with a head of hair that looked like the flames of soccer passion that burn in his heart, Alexi Lalas was one of the icons of the sport in the 1990s. As well as soccer, his musical ability stood out too. He was the player that personifized the World Soccer Cup of 1994 and is widely recognized as one of the faces of the game long after he hung up his cleats.



Abraham Lincoln once said, 'Never, never, never give up.'

That was pretty much the motto of Coach Ferguson and his Manchester Unity franchise as they became the winningest of all the EPL franchises over the time the Scotchman was there. But in May 2012, the guys from a few blocks away were about to show that they subscribed to Lincoln's words of wisdom.

After a 6 to 1 demolition derby earlier in the soccer season, the Manchester Unity had recovered and looked like they would retainify their World Championship again that year. The 'real loud neighbors', as Coach Ferguson would say, had other ideas. The Unity got their asses beat by the Wigan Athletes and the Sky Blues again, meaning that in their final soccer match of the season Manchester City Franchise Club could go win that League Cup.

At the soccer unleashment whistle, Coach Mankini and his soccer players knew that a victory would be enough against Queens Power Rangers, a franchise who were trying to avoid being relegationized from the EPL.

Things did not go that great though for the blue-uniformed soccer machine. As the overtime verdict board was erected, they were down 2 to 1. The Unity had already won their soccer match someplace else, which meant that only victory points would be enough to get that party started.

Surely they had messed up. Even their own soccer fans were pretty mad with them, and chants of 'You guys suck at soccer,' were clearly heard drifting through the Manchester air.

Then, outta nowhere, a Heading Dzeko headkick tied it all up. Suddenly, at twos, the City guys knew they just needed one more goalshot.

When the Queens Power Rangers made the possession concession

after the restart, a tsunami of soccer wetness rushed toward the away franchise's DBZ. As Mario Buyatelly fed the pass-kick to Agwearo, the little guy kicked the soccer ball past the goaltender. It was totally off the hook.

Just as Manchester Unity had started their own party, the 'real loud neighbors' got a whole lot louder.



Denied goalshots have punctuated the words of the story of soccer right the way through, and what happened to the USMNT in 2010 was perhaps the biggest of periods.

After fighting back from 2 down against a very strong Slovenia soccer team, the Americans were denied a slice of World Soccer Cup history in a real cruel way: Landon Donovan's felony kick was passed into the center of the DBZ where Maurice Edu inserted a no-bounce kick. It was a beautiful goalshot, and would have completed one of the most memorable score flip reversals ever. But it was not to be.

The soccer referee (in his home country of Africa) denied the goalshot and awarded the felony kick for the Slovenia deefense. The reason for the denial was pretty much unclear, and the moment went down in history as probably *the* most controversial goalshot that the soccer world has ever seen.

Fortunately, it did not stop the USMNT from making it to the next stage of the World Soccer Cup.



Undoubtedly the biggest headline-maker in the world of soccer recently, it was no great surprise when American teen Freddy Adu got asked to a tryout at one of the world's most winningest franchises, the Manchester Unity, back in 2006.

With the likes of Dwayne Rooney and Cristiarnold Ronaldo on their roster, Coach Ferguson clearly dreamed of pairing Adu with the other two guys to make an even more deadly offense than the lethal one that already existed in Manchester.

Although they were probably impressed by Adu's soccering ability, no reason was ever given as to why he never ended up being a full-time Soccer Devil. Eventually, he ended up going someplace else in EPL Portugal and has never looked back, doing soccer in France, Greece, Turkey and Brazil, as well as back in the MLS.

Many believe that the Unity's failure to tie down Adu was the reason for Ronaldo's departure a few years later.

Coach Ferguson could only look on and think what could have been if he had not let Adu slip through his old Scotch fingers.

TOP 5 NO-BOUNCE KICKS OF ALL TIME

The no-bounce kick is one of the most challengingest skills in soccer—and it sure is a great moment when one of these winds up in the Soccer Goal Interior. Here's five of the best.

5 Zidanine Zidane

After a Robert O'Carlos cross-pass got lobbed to the perimeter of the danger box zone, the French guy's left cleat committed soccer homicide on the ball and sent it into the top of the Bayer Neverleusen net. This strike handed the Euro Soccer Cup back to Real Madrid Franchise Club.

4 Paolo Di Caprio

After a real big kick drifted over the Wimbledon Crazy Guy's deefense line, the bad-ass Italian cycled it into the score net.

3 Τοby Yeahboya

Kicking it real hard, Yeahboya's shot Rick O'Shead down off the crosspipe and bounced into the SGI. It was one of the highlights of Leeds Union's EPL life.

2 Van Basten

A Neverlands cross-pass was kicked way too high to trouble the opposition deefense...or so it seemed. At the far side of the DBZ, Van Basten arrived and kicked it back across the face of the soccer goal. Soccer fans right around the world went crazy as young Van inserted it from a cute angle.

Benny Feilhaber

Sure, the rest of the goalshots on this list have been impressive, but it takes special players to insert them on the biggest of stages. Those stages don't get no bigger than the Gold Cup, and after the Mexican deefense failed to evacuate their danger box that day in 2007, Feilhaber made them pay big time and etched his name into soccer history for all of history.



After just winning a Soccer Cup against Barcelonia, their long-time haters, this was a great night for the Real Madrid soccer franchise and all their fans.

Hitching a ride through the Madrid streets on some kind of cabriolet bus, the soccer players were in party mood, and so were the guys that had turned out to see them. On top of that bus of soccer joy, the soccer players showed off their big shiny Cup, passing it from one guy to the next—eventually it made its way to Sergio Ramos, and the deefense guy went and dropped the Cup off the bus. The wheels of the bus went right over it, to the horror of everyone watching. The bus and partying stopped. Children cried. The Spanish streets emptied as people went home.

The Cup that the guys from the San Diego Bernabowl had soccered so hard to win now looked like it had been run over by a bus. Sergio Ramos looked like a total jerk.



Think 'Wimbledon' and I betcha you guys think of Pete Sampras, right? Well, back in the day, it wasn't just about tennis bats in this corner of London, England.

In the year 1988, Wimbledon Crazy Guys were a franchise that made it all the way to the Franchise Association Soccer Cup final at Wembley Arena. Unfortunately, the Crazy Guys would face off against Liver Pool at the peak of their powers.

When some guy called Sanchez (probably Mexican) gave the Wimbledon franchise an early lead, things were looking up. Being one goalshot up, they knew that if their deefense could make the shutout and deny the Mercytown franchise, they would more than likely win this soccer match.

Incredibly, that was exactly what happened. Wave after wave of offensive play was denied by the Crazy Guys as they hung on to cause one of the biggest soccer shockers ever.

Unfortunately for the fans of the Crazy Guys, the good times faded after they ended up relegationized from the EPL League a few years later. After that, the franchise—as they do from time to time—upped and went someplace else.



In soccer, what goes around comes around. When English soccer player Frank Lamphard thought he'd tied up the soccer match with Germany in 2010, the English were pretty mad when they saw that the soccer match continued. After hitting the top pipe, the soccer ball bounced down and clearly into the soccer goal interior. The denial was costly, as the English guys got beat real bad.

The Germans did not feel that bad, however.

Back in the summer of '69, the English had beaten the Germany Westsiders to take their only World Soccer Cup Cup back home to England. Winning 4 to 2, the match MVP was clearly their main inserter of goalshots, Geoff Hurts, who had kicked a triple of goalshots into what his countrymen famously call the 'ball-bag'.

One of them, the third, is still contestified by the guys from Germany to this day. Just like the Lamphard strike in 2010, the soccer ball bounced down after hitting the top pipe. When the soccer ball hit the deck, the English celebrated. It was not clear if the soccer ball had even entered the SGI, so a confused soccer referee went over to the denial-flag erector. After a quick talk, the goalshot was signalized, much to the anger of Germany.

Even after watching instant replays, it's pretty tough to call whether that soccer ball was a genuine goalshot. As much as Hurts hurt the Germans that day, what happened in 2010 may just have tied things up a little.

Up in the audience, Sheikh Al-Sabah (the owner of Kuwait) was so mad. Even though Kuwait had no chance of even making a tie, the real mad guy ordered that his soccer players exited the soccer field for an illegal time-out and went crazy at the soccer referee until he denied the goalshot.

Eventually, Al got his way, and the soccer match restarted again with the score back at 3 to 1. The French guys eventually did get goalshot number four, leaving the Kuwaitish owner looking a complete soccer douche.

TOP 5 AMERICAN GOALSHOT INSERTERS

5 Joe-Max Moore

Lethal on the international scene, Moore was the face of soccer in the early 00s and enjoyed giving deefenses in Germany and England nightmares at franchise level in a truly unique soccer career.

4 Brian McBride

Lethal on the international scene, McBride was the face of soccer in the early 00s and enjoyed giving deefenses in Germany and England nightmares at franchise level in a truly unique soccer career.

3 Eric Wynalda

Slotting in at three is Eric Wynalda. Impressive on the international scene, Wynalda was a loyal soccer player at franchise level, representing ten different franchises before finally hanging up his cleats.

2 Clint Dempsey

A national hero in America and England, Clint sits in number two in the list of all-time USMNT goalshot inserters.

Landon Donovan

If you could translate 'Landon Donovan' into the language of 'soccer' on Google Translate, it would literally mean 'goalshot inserter'. The greatest of all American scorers.



Some things in soccer never change, no matter how many years pass on by. The best example of this is a soccer referee's ability to always be the guy that people are hatin' on.

At the end of a soccer match between Sweden and Brazil, the Salsa Boys had a totally legit reason to get crazy with the soccer referee.

Having kicked the corner cross-pass, Brazilian MVP Zico got the headkick to send the soccer ball into the Swedish soccer goal. Deep in overtime, this would have guaranteed victory points for the Brazil guys—but thanks to the referee from Whales, England, it was not to be.
